Attendance Matters

September is Attendance Awareness Month. One of our school goals this year is to ensure that every student attends school regularly. Attendance has always been important; however, with a 4-day school week, regular school attendance is critical.

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and in life.

We realize some absences are unavoidable due to health problems or other unavoidable circumstances. But, we also know that when students miss too much school— regardless of the reason – it can cause them to fall behind academically. Your child is less likely to succeed if he or she is chronically absent—which means missing 15 or more days over the course of an entire school year. Research shows:

- Children chronically absent in kindergarten and 1st grade are much less likely to read at grade level by the end of 3rd grade.
- By 6th grade, chronic absence is a proven early warning sign for students at risk for dropping out of school.
- By 9th grade good attendance can predict graduation rates even better than 8th grade test scores.

Absences add up quickly! A child is chronically absent if he or she misses more than three days in a quarter!

AzMERIT & AIMS

Last spring, students in grades 3-5 were tested with AzMERIT. The assessment is a standards-based assessment in Math and English Language Arts which includes reading, writing, and reading. It is important for students to be on time and ready for school each morning! Students may arrive at school as early as **7:45 a.m**. Parents wishing to walk their children to class are welcome to do so. At 7:45, parents may enter the main building and take children to classrooms. The doors between the office and the classrooms will remain closed until 7:45. Thank you for your cooperation! Classroom instruction

until 7:45. Thank you for your cooperation! Classroom instruction begins at 8:00 a.m. Students arriving after 8:05 a.m. are tardy and need to be walked in by parents. If your child will be eating breakfast at school, please ensure that they arrive in time to get breakfast, eat, and make it to class.

Dismissal begins at **3:10 p.m.** with the Kindergarten through 2nd grade students. Third grade through fifth grade are dismissed at 3:15. If there are changes to your child's route home, please communicate the changes <u>early</u> in the day. Changes can be very confusing for students and for staff trying to keep track of many children. However, with good communication, we can

ensure that everyone gets to where they need to be.

Parent Pick-up and Drop-off

The student drop-off in the morning is the parking lot in front of the stairs to the school. Our morning greeter, Ms. Henneman, looks forward to seeing you and your child. Ms. Henneman as well as other staff are not on duty until **7:45**. Please do not drop your child off until you see someone on duty. For longer stops, please park and walk your child to the sidewalk. Students are not permitted in the parking lot without an adult. For those times that you may need to be somewhere early, please make arrangements for your child to either ride the bus or be taken to school by someone else.

In the afternoon, parents may wait in line for your child to be sent to your car or park in the lot and wait for students at the gate. Again, students are not permitted in the parking lot unless escorted by an adult. Please do not call your child from the car as they will not be permitted to enter the lot. This is for your child's safety. Please follow the traffic flow through the parking lot and be courteous to drivers and pedestrians. If you are in line waiting to pick up your child, do not leave your vehicle. <u>Remain with your car</u> and

we will send your child to you.

Walkers and Bike Riders

Students who have a safe walking path may walk to school if parents choose. 3-5 students wishing to ride their bikes must obtain written parental permission and approval of the principal. Forms are available in the Hassayampa office. All walkers and bike riders are reminded to use crosswalks and other safety procedures (see Hassayampa Handbook for additional information). Walkers and bike riders must enter from the front of Hassayampa the same as those who are dropped off by parents. The back entrance to Hassayampa is not an entry for walkers and bike riders.

Reading and Math Nook

DIBELS

Beginning of the year DIBELS testing took place during the first full week of school. Thanks to a dedicated assessment team as well as volunteers, we managed to assess the majority of our students in just four days! Did you know that it takes approximately ten minutes per student? This is time well spent as the results from DIBELS help us to determine the reading needs of our students. DIBELS lets us know if a student is on the trajectory to reading success. After we had the results in our hands, the Hassayampa staff got together to make instructional decisions to move students to the next level. We also determined the extra supports needed for some students to get them on the right path to reading success.

"Move on When Reading"

Arizona Revised Statute 15-701 states that beginning this school year, 3rd graders who score **Minimally Proficient** on the **State Reading** test will be retained in 3rd grade. Parents of students in grades K-3 who are substantially deficient in reading will receive written notification each quarter. Parents will be informed if their child is deficient in reading as well provided information on how Hassayampa teachers are working with your child to get him/her up to level to pass the 3rd grade AzMERIT reading test. In addition, Hassayampa will provide parents with specific information on the deficient areas of reading along with strategies parents can use to help their child at home.

Synergy - ParentVUE

Are you signed up for ParentVUE? Parents, you can access current information on your child's academic progress. With a user ID and password, you have the ability to see your child's grades in each subject area, identify missing assignments, and grade for a particular assignment plus many other things. This can be done from your computer or cell phone. If you don't have your user ID, please stop by the front office for assistance in getting more information on this useful tool. Hard copy progress reports will ONLY be sent home to families who do not have internet access.

MATH FACT FLUENCY!

During the second week of school, students spent a few minutes taking a quick math fact fluency assessment based upon the goals defined below.

Students will have an opportunity to earn an entry ticket each time they pass grade level Math Fact Fluency benchmarks given in October, December, March, and early May.

Math Fact Fluency Goals

Kinder - Count and identify #'s to 100

- 1st Grade addition & subtraction facts to 10
- 2nd Grade addition & subtraction facts to 20
- 3rd Grade addition, subtraction, & multiplication facts
- 4th Grade addition, subtraction, multiplication facts & division facts
- 5th Grade multiplication & division facts & percentage/fractions/decimals conversions

Conversations about school:

At times it is difficult to get your child to talk about their school day. Here are some good suggestions taken from Sherry Artemenko, MA-CCC, Tips to Get Your Child to Talk About Her School Day, *Parents' Choice magazine*.

<u>Ask open-ended questions.</u> Try some open-ended questions like, "Tell me about the game you played at recess today" or "That's a beautiful picture of the farm. Tell me about it." or "I wonder what you had for lunch today."

<u>Use their artwork or take-home papers to start conversations</u>. Take advantage of these masterpieces, asking open ended questions of your little artist and don't forget to listen. . Showing interest in their work can increase their self-esteem as well as link school and home.

<u>Know their school schedule</u> so you can start talking about library day, gym or art class. "What kind of books did the librarian show you today?" or "What did you find at the library?" "Tell me about the books that you chose."

Model sharing about your day. "I had a great day today. I talked to grandma and grandpa about I or "I met a new friend and we had coffee."

<u>Use books as conversation starters.</u> Choose a book about school and see what conversation unfolds. For a laugh out loud, read <u>What a Day it was at School!</u> by Jack Prelutsky. His collection of poems about school "tipping over with a heavy backpack, throwing food in the cafeteria, hopelessly competing with a classmate in gym, or emitting an accidental noise during class" is outrageously silly, getting a child laughing and connecting the stories to her school experience.

<u>Take advantage of your child stalling at bedtime.</u> One mother shared with me that if she lingers with her first-grade son after stories are read and the bedtime routine is over, she can count on about 10 minutes of chat about his day. He's smart" he knows what mom likes and how to stay up longer!

<u>Listen, listen, and listen.</u> Once your child gets started talking about her day, hold off more questions and let her go. As parents, we tend to jump in with more questions, but pausing is important. A child gains confidence as she relates her day and you affirm her.
