TIPS FOR REMOTE LEARNING

Choose a Learning Space:

Consider your child's learning environment. Choose a space that works for all members in your family. The space should include supplies that your child may need to complete assignments, such as lined paper, pencils/pens, items from the learning kits, etc. Your child should feel comfortable in their learning space.

When choosing this space, think about the background if your child is in a meeting with their classroom teacher and peers. Will people be seen or heard in the background? What are the other family members wearing? What are others saying? Keep in mind that everyone in your child's classroom can see and hear what is happening in your household during these live meetings.

- Find a quiet location for your child to participate in class and to do their independent work.
- Ensure that the learning space is comfortable for your child and is school appropriate.
- Limit distractions.
- Be sure to check in with your child; the amount of learning support will vary by age and individual need.
- Keep the class schedule available to ensure class time is not missed

Communication:

Communication is essential! We encourage all parents to reach out to their child's teacher with questions and concerns as we continue to strive for academic excellence. You will find teachers' email addresses on our school website. Many families enjoy the convenience of using Class Dojo for communication as well. Keep in mind that Class Dojo doesn't necessarily alert the teacher when a message has come through. If there is a delay in communication, please contact the teacher through the school email.

The last few months, weeks and days have been difficult for everyone across the country. We have all faced challenges that impact our physical, mental and emotional health. You may be experiencing feelings of stress, fear, exhaustion

and even anger. You are not alone.

We, the staff at Hassayampa, are here to support your family every step of the way in returning to school. That's why I will continue to share tips and resources to help you and your children take care of your mental health and well-being during this challenging time.

Here are tips from the **USA Mental Health First Aid** for attending school and helping your children cope with this pandemic:

1. Talk to your child about the COVID-19 pandemic and school. Reassure them that they are safe, and things will go back to normal in the future.

2. **Try to maintain a routine.** Create a schedule with learning activities, regular meals and fun games to keep kids engaged while at home.

3. **Monitor media consumption.** Kids are always listening, so limit the amount of exposure you give them to news coverage about COVID-19.

4. Encourage your child to try something new that interests them. This might be building with Legos, putting together a new puzzle or creating artwork.

5. Maintain family and other social ties. Stay connected with family and friends through phone and video calls regularly.
 6. Be a role model. If you are calm and confident about the situation, your child is likely to be too.

Conversations about Character Counts! What does good character look like?

Our character is revealed by how we act when we think nobody is looking. During the first quarter, students will be learning about the 6 pillars of good character: Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring and Citizenship. Character education is necessary to help children develop the tools and strategies they need to make moral choices that make them proud. Don't worry.
